# **Transplant Trek**

"Let's do a sponsored trek. Oh, and we'll aim to finish it in six months after the operation."



This was what I said after completing a gruelling long distance hike of fifteen minutes round our local park about a week after being discharged from hospital. The operation I referred to was a kidney transplant.

I was diagnosed with kidney disease in June 2009. Like a lot of people I was shocked as I had never felt ill at all. Our eldest daughter, Kassie, was emigrating to Australia that same week so my husband, John, and I decided not to say anything about it. We kept the news to ourselves and two very close friends for 15 months when Kassie came back after missing family and friends too much. We told all three children at the same time and all three offered to donate a kidney. I did not want to put any of my children through this and refused Kassie as she has two small children and Ella as she has not yet had any children and if she

does one never knows what effects on the body that pregnancy can have. I also tried to refuse my son Chris but he could not see why and insisted on at least going through the tests for compatibility.

To cut a long story short, on 18 November, I received a kidney from Chris (in exchange for a homemade pie a month for life!). The team at MRI were amazing from diagnosis to transplant and ongoing, so I and John wanted to put something back into the hospital as a big thank you for all my treatment. So there we were planning a trek in the Lake District. We decided to do a circular mountain walk of 125 miles with a total ascent of 12,180m, equivalent to nearly one and a half times Everest. Due in part to weather and in part to my over estimation of my fitness, we actually managed 103 miles, 10,668m and 25 major peaks.

To generate sponsorship money for the trek we also arranged two fundraising events at a local restaurant with an auction and raffle at each. These two events (plus general arm twisting!) raised over £6,000.

What follows is an edited version of the diary we kept during our "Transplant Trek" – this can be found in more detail on the Kidneys for Life website under patient stories.

#### Day One Grasmere to Coniston

8 hrs 20 mins

Climbed - Silver How (395m) and Loughrigg (335m)

What a glorious first day! From newborn lambs and fields of bluebells, beautiful tarns and wild deer, to screaming tornados and a lumbering Lancaster, all in beautiful warm sunshine.

# Day Two Coniston to Elterwater

8 hrs

Climbed - Old Man (803m), Swirl How (802m) and Wetherlam (762m)

What a contrast, we woke up and couldn't see the mountain out of our window and it was raining... hard! No choice but to continue and even with all our wet weather gear we were soaked to the skin that day. Our descent from Wetherlam was slow and tricky because of the weather and the way down was mostly on our backsides through virtual waterfalls on the crags. We arrived at the B&B wet, wet very WET!

#### Day Three

#### **Elterwater to Wasdale Head**

7 hrs

Climbed - None (Weather!!!!)

Very tired after epic day before but the rain seemed to be a little lighter and we even saw the sun peep through the clouds so we set off in good heart but by the time we got to the bottom of the climb to Crinkle Crags the rain had moved back in and then the snow and blizzard of hail caused us to crouch down in a small shelter and add layers. Mountains impossible to climb with the weather and we finally arrived at Burnthwaite Farm, a most welcome sight, to spend the night.

#### **Day Four**

#### **Wasdale Head to Buttermere**

6 hrs 20 mins

Climbed - None

Made our walk easier today as feeling effects of the three previous days. Weather was lovely and we met some walkers who were out without maps or compass and two Americans were completely lost until we pointed them in right direction. Shaking our heads in disbelief we continued on to Buttermere through Scarth Gap.

# Day Five Buttermere to Braithwaite

5 hrs 30 mins

Climbed – None (Can you guess weather yet again!)

Woke up to what looked like another nice day and started our climb to Whiteless Pike and yet again the weather intervened as three quarters of the way up we could no longer stand upright, even with walking poles for support (winds reported at 85mph). We decided we would do the lower route to Braithwaite, on the way we passed several groups of teenagers doing the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award, one even carrying a rugby ball! At about 2pm that day after an easy day I looked up at Skiddaw (tomorrow's climb) and realised I was running on empty and although it was a hard decision John decided that was it and we would go home the next day. We rang family and friends and everyone said that completing a five day trek in torrential rain, hail, snow and gale force winds was a real achievement and we were right to stop and not jeopardise my health. We resumed the walk after a four week break...

# Whispers

#### Day Six Stair to Portinscale

7 hrs 30 mins

Climbed – High Spy (653m) and Maiden Moor (576m)

Great day with wonderful views and a lovely ridge walk to Maiden Moor and on to Cat Bells above Derwent Water. Excellent progress and felt so good that when we got down to the lakeshore we called in for tea and a huge scone!

## Day Seven Portinscale to Threlkeld

8 hrs

Climbed – Carl Side (746m), Skiddaw (931m), Long Side (734m) and Ullock Pike (692m)

A nice long flat walk-in to get warmed up and then the climb began. Steep and brutal to the top of Carl Side and then we decided to add on Long Side and Ullock Pike but glad we did as it was nice to add on tops as opposed to doing no mountains. At Skiddaw it was like Blackpool on the top with loads of people massed round the cairn, we left the crowds and started our descent on a very rocky, steep path... so hard on getting older knees!

## Day Eight Threlkeld to Patterdale

8 hrs 30 mins

Climbed – Clough Head (726m), Great Dodd (857m), Stybarrow Dodd (843m), Raise (883m), Lower Man (925m), Helvellyn (950m) and Catstycam (890m)

Although the day threatened rain we had a cold southeasterly wind giving a perfect day for walking. A long climb up followed by a fantastic high ridge walk to Helvellyn, the descent of Swirral Edge was slow and careful, it needed to be climbed down as opposed to walking.

#### **Day Nine**

#### **Patterdale to Troutbeck**

6 hrs 40 mins

Climbed – Threshthwaite Mouth (600m), Thornthwaite Crag (784m), Froswick (720m), III Bell (757m) and Yoke (706m)

Set off in pouring rain and walked up the wild and beautiful, orchid filled Pasture Back to Threshthwaite Mouth. Near the top the skies turned an ominous black followed by thunder and lightning and when it started to hail, we were battered by what looked like tons of frozen peas! The path we were walking on turned into a river and we were soaked. At the top the hail ceased and we remained in the only bit of bright sky. We then climbed up Thornthwaite Crag although we could see nothing, it was an ethereal experience walking in the cloud but a super days walk.



Looking back it was a great adventure for a new kidney and hopefully more will follow.


#### Day Ten

#### **Troutbeck to Grasmere**

7hrs 30 mins

Climbed – Wansfell Pike (484m), Dove Crag (792m), Hart Crag (822m) and Fairfield (873m)

The cloud was low when we started and we could hardly see our hands in front of our faces. We had a little trouble finding the top of the Pike but after joint navigation with a guy who appeared out of the mist we all three gained the summit. The weather cleared and we three started the ascent of Fairfield over Dove & Hart Crag... being passed on the way by two girls running and talking at the same time! Felt quite old at this point. The cloud lifted just long enough for us to have views from the top and we descended into Grasmere – WE DID IT!!!

# RHS Tatton Flower Show Garden for Kidneys for Life

The garden designed by Harry's Gold Stars was a big hit at RHS Tatton Flower Show this year and received a Bronze Medal from the judges, although we all thought they deserved a 'Gold Medal'.





The garden was designed around the theme of kidney transplants which have the best chance of success when there is a match between blood and tissue and there are no antibodies in the recipient that would damage the new kidney, this test is called 'cross matching'. Hence the name of the garden – 'A Perfect Match'.

The colour scheme had been chosen to represent the matching required. The garden was designed to be a relaxing and tranquil space. It was formal in structure with a channel of water flowing through the centre to a gently bubbling water feature. The materials used were symbolic, reclaimed stone reflects the donated organ, the channel made of polished steel symbolises new life, whilst a seat allowed the visitor to look back along the channel, a place to contemplate the journey to transplant. The flow of water was there to represent the changing kidney function following a transplant, slow at first until it gently bubbles to life in the pool. Pots of herbs at intervals along the water's edge represented the cleansing nature of the working kidney. There were three beds all edged in white lavender to signify purity. On either side of the channel the beds had a single birch tree in the centre. Each of the three beds consisted of two colours

with purple planting in all the beds. The other colour in each bed was symbolic of matching blood, tissue or the crossmatch. Red was used to symbolise matching blood type, blue was used to represent matching tissue and yellow, opposite purple on the colour wheel, signified the cross-match element.

The garden was featured in the Manchester Evening News, Granada Reports and Carol Klein of Gardeners World used the garden to explain the colour wheel process on BBC Gardeners World.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank Harry's Gold Stars (Maile Belanger, Peter Armstrong-Child, Marc Brimble, Margaret Kewley, Pauline Clarke, Richard Bowser & Colin Greenwood) for all their efforts in designing and creating the garden raising awareness of kidney transplants and kidney disease to all those who visited the garden at the show.

# **Jean Ross**Kidney transplant patient of 33 years with 21 year old triplets



At the age of 12, I started to feel ill at school, dizzy spells, blurred vision and tiredness. Prior to this I had a massive haemorrhage and they think this caused my organs to shut down. My kidneys were failing! I was taken in for tests and discovered my kidneys were only working at 95%.

I went on haemodialysis first and later went on to full dialysis on a kidney machine at Booth Hall Childrens hospital for 6 hours, 3 times a week. This meant one day on the machine and the next day I would be so tired that I would sleep all day, then the next day back to hospital for another dialysis session and this was my routine for approx 6 years. This was a real ordeal for all the family, it left me drained and exhausted, all I did was sleep. Sometimes I felt so weak that I couldn't even climb the stairs, my father used to carry me up. I was prone to viral infections and needed to go in and out of hospital all the time.

I will never forget the night the phone rang to say that I had a kidney, it was a mad rush to get my things and then the police and ambulance came to escort me to Manchester Royal Infirmary for the transplant. We couldn't believe that the day had finally arrived. Tests were carried out for suitability and I remember crying thinking that this would be the last time that I would have to be on a kidney machine. It was such a relief to us all but I would never forget that someone had died and some other family were grieving for a lost loved one.

When I awoke from surgery I had lots of tubes and drips, but the changed in me was instant, in that I had pink cheeks and looked a picture of health. Gradually the drips were removed and I felt that I could walk around without feeling tired and my appetite came back and I was able to eat whatever I wanted. Thirteen days later I was allowed to go home which was amazing!

I need to take drugs for the rest of my life and attend the MRI for checkups on a regular basis, but this is nothing compared to having my life back.

Life has moved on for me, I have gone on to have four children, Keith 22 and my natural born triplets (a miracle in itself) Scott, Hannah and Suzanne, the triplets were born one month early, I was taken to hospital so the birth could be induced and at the time I had to wait for two days and I was in labour for six hours and then the first baby arrived. It was a boy and I had this feeling they'd all be boys, but eight minutes later, Hannah popped out, I was thrilled because I'd really hoped for a girl and then another girl arrived! Suzanne weighed so little, she was put in an incubator, but she made good

progress and two days later I held all three babies together.

The triplets have just celebrated their 21st Birthday so by someone donating a kidney it has given life to myself and my four children. What better gift can there be than the gift of life.

Shortly after the triplets were born I was featured in an article in Woman Magazine and in fact I still have the article back from 1991.

I'm now 51 and have had my kidney 33 years which is amazing but I will never forget someone has lost a loved one. I now work at Funtastic, a play centre on Kenyon Street in Radcliffe, run by my Niece, Sandra, which I really enjoy.



In fact Sandra and the team at Funtastic have been fundraising for Kidneys for Life over the past few months organising events and special Party Days for the children at the centre including, Pirate & Princess Day, Olympic Day, Football Day and Summer Holiday Day and much fun was had by all.

# **Research Projects**

# MINT at Manchester Royal Infirmary has been successful in obtaining a number of grants recently. The projects include:

### Grant to find cure for autoimmune kidney disease

Manchester experts are among a team of researchers awarded £890,000 by the Medical Research Council to investigate the link between the body's immune system and the kidney disease, membranous nephropathy (MN), to try to develop a cure.

#### "EURenOmics": European Consortium for High-Throughput Research in Rare Kidney Diseases

Manchester is one of 26 Renal Research Centres across Europe collaborating in this 12 Million euro project from 2012-2017.

Prof Brenchley is leading a Manchester team from MRI renal unit (including Shelley Harris, Dr Michael Venning, Dr Mumtaz Patel) and the University of Manchester (including Dr Tom Jowitt, Dr Edward Mckenzie, Dr Jennet Gummadova) in this exciting new pan European study of kidney disease across Europe.

### Grant on anti-PLA2R antibodies in membranous nephropathy

Prof Brenchley is leading a team to understand how a-PLA2R auto antibodies that target the podocyte. the specialist cell in the glomerulus that controls filtration of the blood, cause proteinuria in membranous nephropathy with a grant of £157,000 from Kidney Research UK. Dr Rachel Lennon, Paediatric Renal Consultant at Royal Manchester Childrens Hospital and Wellcome Trust Clinical Investigator in Faculty of Life Sciences at University of Manchester is using in vitro cell culture techniques to model the behaviour of glomerular podocytes. This project seeks to prove that a-PLA2R are pathogenic agents able to modulate podocyte function in vitro. Such evidence may transform management of IMN to focus on reduction and removal of a-PLA2R with the same urgency that auto antibodies to glomerular basement membrane (GBM) are removed in anti-GBM disease. This may improve outcomes for patients with IMN with immediate effect.

#### National Rare Disease Working Group established for Membranous Nephropathy

Prof Paul Brenchley and Dr Michael Venning at MRI have led the formation of a National Rare Disease working group for patients with Membranous nephropathy which has attracted financial support of £12,000 from the KRUK/Renal Association scheme. The working group will be established in the Autumn and will develop over the next 3 years three main proposals:

- Developing evidenced based clinical care pathways
- Empowering and informing patients and families
- Auditing clinical outcomes

The pilot research studies in Manchester for some of the projects were supported by Kidneys for Life. More information on these grants can be found on our website under research.

Kidneys for Life have just announced another round of Small Research Grants relating to projects into renal disease, transplantation and dialysis with a deadline of 31 October and we will let you know the outcome of the applications in our next edition of Whispers.
